Directors' Interests

No director has an interest in the Ordinary Shares of the Company as at the date of this report.

Prior to the change in ownership (described below) Graham Tuckwell held an interest in the Ordinary Shares of the Company as the majority shareholder of ETF Securities Limited.

Principal Activities

The Company's principal activity is the issue and listing of Swiss Franc currency-hedged commodity securities ("Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities"). The Company's current portfolio of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities contains Classic Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and Longer Dated Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities.

Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are financial instruments designed to track the price of commodity futures and give investors an exposure similar to that which could be achieved by managing a long fully cash-collateralised unleveraged position in futures contracts. However, unlike managing a futures position, Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities involve no need to roll from one futures contract to another, no margin calls, and no brokerage or other costs in holding or rolling futures contracts (although Security Holders incur other costs in holding Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities). No trading or management of futures contracts is required by the Company.

Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities also aim to minimise the impact of exchange rate movements on a Swiss Franc investor's return by hedging on a daily basis the US Dollar price of the relevant commodity futures against exchange rate movements between the US Dollar and the Swiss Franc.

Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are backed by commodity contracts ("Commodity Contracts") with terms corresponding to the terms of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. The Company entered into two Facility Agreements, one with Citigroup Global Markets Limited ("Citigroup") and one with Merrill Lynch International ("Merrill Lynch") (together the "Commodity Contract Counterparties"), enabling the Company to create and cancel Commodity Contracts on an ongoing basis.

UBS Securities AG, London Branch ("UBS") was a commodity contract counterparty and had entered into an agreement with the Company on similar terms to the current facility agreements with the existing Commodity Contract Counterparties. The facility agreement with UBS was terminated on 24 October 2017 and the Commodity Contracts outstanding thereunder were replaced by equivalent Commodity Contracts with Citigroup.

Each time Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are issued or redeemed, matching Commodity Contracts between the Company and a Commodity Contract Counterparty are created or cancelled by the Company.

Principal Activities (continued)

The price of each class of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security is calculated on a daily basis and reflects movements in the Bloomberg Commodity Index relevant to that class since the previous day, adjusted by any applicable fees. Therefore, the return for a particular class of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security will primarily be based on the performance of the relevant Bloomberg Commodity Index.

Each Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Index is calculated by reference to the corresponding unhedged Commodity Index and provides a hedge against movements in the exchange rate between the US Dollar and the Swiss Franc, which is rebalanced on a daily basis. As the Company issues securities which provide exposure to the daily movements in one of that Bloomberg Commodity Indices and the Company gains exposure to the movements in the Bloomberg Commodity Indices by holding corresponding Commodity Contracts, the Company is not required to undertake any currency hedging activities.

The Company earns a management fee and a licence allowance based upon the number of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities in issue. These fees are expressed as an annual percentage, calculated on a daily basis and reflected in the Net Asset Value ("NAV") of the Securities on a daily basis, and paid monthly in arrears.

The Company has entered into a service agreement with ETFS Management Company (Jersey) Limited ("ManJer" or the "Manager"), whereby ManJer is responsible for supplying or procuring the supply of all management and administration services required by the Company, (including marketing) as well as the payment of costs relating to the listing and issue of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. In return for these services, the Company pays ManJer an amount equal to the aggregate of the management fee, licence allowance and the creation and redemption fees (the "ManJer Fee"). As a result, amounts in respect of the management fee and licence allowance are transferred directly to ManJer by the Commodity Contract Counterparties under the terms of the Commodity Contracts and ManJer receives creation and redemption fees directly from Authorised Participants. Accordingly there are no cash flows through the Company.

Review of Operations

The most recent Prospectus was issued on 5 October 2017. As at 31 December 2017, the Company had the following number of classes, in aggregate, of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities in issue and admitted to trading on the following exchanges:

As at 31 December 2017, the fair value of assets under management amounted to USD 25.1 million (2016: USD 29.1 million). The Company recognises its financial assets (Commodity Contracts) and financial liabilities (Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities) at fair value in the Statement of Financial Position.

During the year, the Company generated income from creation and redemption fees, management fees and licence allowance as follows:

Review of Operations (continued)

Under the terms of the service agreement with ManJer, the Company accrued expenses equal to the management fees and licence allowance and creation and redemption fees, which, after taking into account other operating income and expenses, resulted in an operating result for the period of USD Nil (2016: USD Nil).

The gain or loss on Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and Commodity Contracts is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income in line with the Company's accounting policy.

The Company has entered into contractual obligations to issue and redeem Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities at set prices on each trading day. These prices are based on an agreed formula published in the Prospectus, and are equal to the published NAV of each class of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities.

IFRS 13 requires the Company to identify the principal market and to utilise the available market price within that principal market. The directors consider that the stock exchanges where the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are listed to be the principal market and as a result the fair value of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities is the on-exchange price as quoted on those stock exchanges demonstrating active trading. As a result of the difference in valuation methodology between Commodity Contracts and Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities there is a mis-match between accounting values, and the results of the Company reflect a gain or loss on the difference between the agreed formula price of the Commodity Contracts and the market price of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. This gain or loss would be reversed on a subsequent redemption of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and cancellation of the corresponding Commodity Contracts. This is presented in more detail in note 7 to these financial statements.

The Company's exposure to risks is discussed in note 11 to the financial statements.

Going Concern

The nature of the Company's business dictates that the outstanding Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities may be redeemed at any time by the holder and in certain circumstances may be compulsorily redeemed by the Company. As the redemption of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities will always coincide with the cancellation of an equal amount of Commodity Contracts, no liquidity risk is considered to arise. All other expenses of the Company are met by ManJer; therefore the directors consider the Company to be a going concern.

On 13 November 2017 the Company announced that WisdomTree Investments, Inc ("WisdomTree") (an exchange-traded product sponsor and asset manager) entered into an agreement to acquire ETF Securities Limited's European exchange-traded product business as a going concern, which includes the Company. The Company continues as a going concern following completion of the acquisition on 11 April 2018.

Future Developments

Referendum of the United Kingdom's ("UK's") membership of the European Union (the "EU Referendum")

The EU referendum took place on 23 June 2016 and resulted in an overall vote to leave the European Union ("EU"). The British government invoked Article 50 of the Lisbon Treaty on 29 March 2017 which started the two-year period during which a leaving agreement is to be negotiated setting out the arrangements for the withdrawal and outlining the UK's future relationship with the EU. The exact process for the UK's withdrawal is uncertain, although it is generally expected to take longer than two years as this would require the renegotiation of treaties and agreements, together with legislation changes.

The Company is domiciled in Jersey, outside of the EU, and the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are distributed in the EU under the EU Prospectus Directive which requires their offering to the public to be approved by an EU Member State regulator. To date, the Company has chosen the UK Financial Conduct Authority ("FCA") as its member state regulator for these purposes. Request is then made to the FCA, as the chosen Member State regulator, for the passporting of the offering across the EU, once again, under the Prospectus Directive.

Future Developments (continued)

Referendum of the United Kingdom's ("UK's") membership of the European Union (the "EU Referendum") (Continued)

It is currently expected that the Company would select an alternate EU Member State regulator through which to seek approval and request passporting for its offering to maintain the Company's access to relevant markets. As the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities already comply with the European wide requirements of the Prospectus Directive, this is not expected to cause any disruption or alteration to the terms or nature of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities.

The Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities continue to comply with all applicable laws and regulations. Continued assessment of the impact will be required throughout the withdrawal process.

Change of Ownership

On 13 November 2017 the Company announced that WisdomTree entered into an agreement to acquire ETF Securities Limited's European exchange-traded product business, which includes the Company. The change of ownership occurred on 11 April 2018.

The board of directors (the "Board") are not aware of any other developments that might have a significant effect on the operations of the Company in subsequent financial periods not already disclosed in this report or the attached financial statements.

Risk Management

Each Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security is a debt instrument whose redemption price is linked directly to the performance of the underlying hedged commodity index. The Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are issued under limited recourse arrangements whereby the holders have recourse only to the value of the Commodity Contracts attributable to the class of security they hold and not to the Company. In addition, since any such price movements are wholly attributable to the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security holders, the Company has no residual exposure to price movements of the Commodity Contracts. From a commercial perspective, the gains or losses on the liability represented by the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are matched economically by corresponding losses or gains attributable to the Commodity Contracts (see detail above regarding the accounting mismatch). The Company does not retain any net gains or losses or net risk exposures. Further details surrounding the value of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security and the Commodity Contracts are disclosed in note 11.

Movements in the price of the underlying hedged commodity index, and thus the value of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, may vary widely which could have an impact on the demand for the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities issued by the Company. These movements are shown in notes 6 and 7.

The Company has exposure to country and currency risk as the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities provide investors with exposure to exchange rate movements between the US Dollar and the Swiss Franc. However, the directors do not consider the Company to have a significant net exposure to country and currency risk as the gains or losses on the liability represented by the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are matched economically by losses or gains attributable to the Commodity Contracts.

Auditor

A resolution to reappoint KPMG Channel Islands Limited as the auditor of the Company will be proposed at the next meeting of the directors.

Dividends

There were no dividends declared or paid in the year (2016: Nil). It is the Company's policy that dividends will only be declared when the directors are of the opinion that there are sufficient distributable reserves.

Employees

The Company does not have any employees. It is the Company's policy to use the services of specialist subcontractors or consultants as far as possible.

Directors' Remuneration

No director has a service contract with the Company. The directors of the Company who are employees within the ETF Securities Limited group or within the WisdomTree group do not receive separate remuneration in their capacity as directors of the Company. R&H Fund Services (Jersey) Limited ("R&H" or the "Administrator") receives a fee in respect of the directors of the Company who are employees of R&H.

Gregory Barton and Peter Ziembra were not directors of the Company during the years ending 31 December 2017 and 2016, and therefore have been excluded from the table above.

Corporate Governance

There is no standard code of corporate governance in Jersey. The operations, as previously described in the directors' report, are such that the directors do not consider the Company is required to voluntarily apply the UK Corporate Governance Code.

As the Board is small, there is no nomination committee and appointments of new directors are considered by the Board as a whole. The Board does not consider it appropriate that directors should be appointed for a specific term. Furthermore, the structure of the Board is such that it is considered unnecessary to identify a senior non-executive director.

The constitution of the Board is disclosed on page 2. The Board meets regularly as required by the operations of the Company, but at least quarterly to review the overall business of the Company and to consider matters specifically reserved for its review.

Internal Control

During the year the Company did not have any employees or subsidiaries, and there is no intention that this will change. The Company, being a special purpose company established for the purpose of issuing Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, has not undertaken any business, save for issuing and redeeming Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, entering into the required documents and performing the obligations and exercising its rights in relation thereto, since its incorporation. The Company does not intend to undertake any business other than issuing and redeeming Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and performing the obligations and exercising its rights in relation thereto.

The Company is dependent upon ManJer to provide management and administration services to it. ManJer is licensed under the Financial Services (Jersey) Law 1998 to conduct classes U and Z of Fund Services Business (ManJer was also licensed to conduct class V of Fund Services Business until 11 April 2018). ManJer outsources the administration services in respect of the Company to R&H. Documented contractual arrangements are in place with the Manager and the Administrator which define the areas where the authority is delegated to them. The performance of the Manager and Administrator are reviewed on an ongoing basis by the Board through their review of periodic reports.

Internal Control (continued)

ManJer provides management and other services to both the Company and other companies issuing commodity and index tracking securities.

The Board having reviewed the effectiveness of the internal control systems of the Manager and R&H, and having a regard to the role of its external auditor, does not consider that there is a need for the Company to establish its own internal audit function.

Audit Committee

The Board has not established a separate audit committee; instead the Board has met to consider the financial reporting by the Company, the internal controls, and relations with the external auditor. In addition the Board reviews the independence and objectivity of the auditors.

Our opinion is unmodified

We have audited the financial statements of Swiss Commodity Securities Limited (the "Company"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2017, the statements of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, cash flows and changes in equity for the year then ended, and notes, comprising significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2017, and of the Company's financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended;
- are prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies (Jersey) Law, 1991.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities are described below. We have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities under, and are independent of the Company in accordance with, UK ethical requirements including FRC Ethical Standards as applied to listed entities. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is a sufficient and appropriate basis for our opinion.

The notes on pages 18 to 29 form part of these financial statements

1. General Information

Swiss Commodity Securities Limited (the “Company”) is a company incorporated in Jersey. The address of the registered office is Ordnance House, 31 Pier Road, St. Helier, Jersey, JE4 8PW.

ETFS Management Company (Jersey) Limited and the related European exchange-traded product business specialises in the development and issuance of Exchange Traded Products (“ETPs”). ETPs include Exchange Traded Commodities (“ETCs”) and Exchange Traded Funds (“ETFs”). The ETCs issued by the Company are secured, undated, limited recourse debt securities designed to track the value (before fees and expenses) of an underlying commodity, index or currency while providing market liquidity for the investor.

The purpose of the Company is to provide a vehicle that permits trading of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and the Company does not make gains from trading in the underlying Commodity Contracts themselves. The Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are issued under limited recourse arrangements whereby the Company has no residual exposure to price movements of the underlying assets, therefore from a commercial perspective gains and losses in respect of Commodity Contracts will always be offset by a corresponding loss or gain on the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. Further details regarding the risks of the Company are disclosed in note 11.

ETCs are not typically actively managed, are significantly lower in cost when compared to actively managed mutual funds and are easily accessible to investors. No trading or management of futures contracts is required by Company because the Company has entered into arrangements to acquire an equivalent asset exposure to the underlying assets from third parties which fully hedges the exposure of the Company.

The Company is entitled to:

- (1) a management fee and licence allowance which are calculated by applying a fixed percentage to the contractual value of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities in issue on a daily basis; and
- (2) creation and redemption fees on the issue and redemption of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities.

No creation or redemption fees are payable to the Company when investors trade in the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities on a listed market such as the Swiss Stock Exchange.

The Company has entered into a service agreement with ETFS Management Company (Jersey) Limited (“ManJer” or the “Manager”), whereby ManJer is responsible for supplying or procuring the supply of all management and administration services required by the Company, (including marketing) as well as the payment of costs relating to the listing and issuance of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. In return for these services, the Company pays ManJer an amount equal to the management fee, licence allowance and the creation and redemption fees earned (the “ManJer Fee”). As a result there are no operating profits or losses recognised through the Company.

2. Accounting Policies

The main accounting policies of the Company are described below.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRSs”) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (“IASB”), and interpretations issued by the International Financial Reporting Interpretations Committee of the IASB. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities held at fair value through profit or loss.

2. Accounting Policies (continued)

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The presentation of financial statements in conformity with IFRSs requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies.

The Company makes estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities. Estimates are continually evaluated and based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The only key accounting judgement required to prepare these financial statements is in respect of the valuation of Commodity Contracts and Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities held at fair value through profit or loss as disclosed in notes 6 and 7. Actual results could vary from these estimates.

Going Concern

The nature of the Company's business dictates that the outstanding Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities may be redeemed at any time by the holder and in certain circumstances may be compulsorily redeemed by the Company. Generally, only security holders who have entered into an authorised participant agreement with the Company ("Authorised Participant") can submit applications and redemptions directly with the Company. As the redemption of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities will always coincide with the cancellation of an equal amount of Commodity Contracts, no net liquidity risk is considered to arise. All other expenses of the Company are met by ManJer; therefore the directors consider the Company to be a going concern for the foreseeable future and have prepared the financial statements on this basis.

On 13 November 2017, the Company announced that WisdomTree Investments, Inc (an exchange-traded product sponsor and asset manager) entered into an agreement to acquire ETF Securities Limited's European exchange-traded product business as a going concern, which includes the Company. The Company continues as a going concern following completion of the acquisition on 11 April 2018.

Accounting Standards

(a) *Standards, amendments and interpretations adopted in the year:*

In preparing the financial statements the Company has adopted all new or revised Standards and Interpretations, including:

- IAS 12 Income Taxes
- IAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows – Disclosure Initiative
- Annual Improvements to IFRS (including IFRS 12 Disclosure of Interest in Other Entities)

Of those Standards and Interpretations adopted in the current year, none have resulted in any significant effect on these financial statements.

(b) *New and revised IFRSs in issue but not yet effective:*

The Company has not applied the following new and revised IFRSs that have been issued but are not yet effective:

- IFRS 2 Share-based Payment (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018)
- IFRS 4 Insurance Contracts (overlay approach to be applied when IFRS 9 is first applied, deferral approach effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018 and only available for three years after that date)
- IFRS 9 Financial Instruments (as amended in 2014) (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018)
- IFRS 10 Consolidated Financial Statements and IAS 28 Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures (2011) – Sale or Contribution of Assets between an Investor and its Associate or Joint Venture (no effective date set)

- IFRS 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018)

- IAS 28 Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019)

- Annual Improvements to IFRS

The directors intend to adopt IFRS 9 for the annual period beginning on 1 January 2018. The directors have undertaken an assessment of the impact of adoption IFRS 9 and have concluded that there would be minimal impact on the amounts reported in respect of the Company's financial instruments. Disclosures in the financial statements will be amended as necessary to meet the requirements of the standard.

The directors do not expect the adoption of the remaining standards, amendments and interpretations that are in issue but not yet effective will have a material impact on the financial statements of the Company in future periods.

The directors have considered other standards and interpretations in issue but not effective and concluded that they would not have a material impact on the future financial periods when they become available.

Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and Commodity Contracts

i) Issue and Redemption

The Company has entered into facility agreements with Citigroup Global Markets Limited ("Citigroup") and Merrill Lynch International ("Merrill Lynch") (collectively the "Commodity Contract Counterparties"). The facility agreements permit the Company to create and cancel Commodity Contracts at prices equivalent to Commodity Securities issued or redeemed on the same day. Each time a Commodity Security is issued or redeemed by the Company a corresponding number and value of Commodity Contracts are created or cancelled with the Commodity Contract Counterparties.

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised and de-recognised on the transaction date.

UBS Securities AG, London Branch ("UBS") was a commodity contract counterparty and had entered into an agreement with the Company on similar terms to the current facility agreements with the existing Commodity Contract Counterparties. The facility agreement with UBS was terminated on 24 October 2017 and the Commodity Contracts outstanding thereunder were replaced by equivalent Commodity Contracts with Citigroup.

ii) Pricing

The Commodity Contracts are priced by reference to certain currency-hedged commodity indices calculated and published by Bloomberg L.P. or Bloomberg Finance L.P. (together "Bloomberg") and a multiplier calculated by the Company and agreed with the Commodity Contract Counterparties. The multiplier takes into account the daily accrual of the management fee, licence allowance and swap spread as well as the incremental capital enhancement component of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security, and is the same across all Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities of the same type (i.e. all Classic Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities use the same multiplier). This price is calculated based on the formula set out in the Prospectus, and is referred to as the 'Contractual Value'.

2. Accounting Policies (continued)

Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and Commodity Contracts (continued)

ii) Pricing (continued)

IFRS 13 requires the Company to identify the principal market and to utilise the available market price within that principal market. The directors consider that the stock exchanges where the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are listed to be the principal market and as a result the fair value of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities is the on-exchange price as quoted on those stock exchanges demonstrating active trading. The Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are priced using the closing mid-market price on the Statement of Financial Position date.

Consequently a difference arises between the value of Commodity Contracts (at Contractual Value) and Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities (at market value) presented in the Statement of Financial Position. This difference is reversed on a subsequent redemption of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and cancellation of the corresponding Commodity Contracts.

iii) Designation at fair value through Profit or Loss

Each Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security and Commodity Contract comprises a financial instrument whose redemption or cancellation price is linked to the performance of the relevant commodity index adjusted by the applicable fees and expenses.

These instruments are designated at fair value through profit or loss upon initial recognition. This is in order to enable gains or losses on both the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and Commodity Contracts to be recorded in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income.

Through the mis-matched accounting values, the results of the Company reflect a gain or loss which represents the movement in the cumulative difference between the Contractual Value (based on the formula set out in the Prospectus) of the Commodity Contracts and the market price of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. This gain or loss is transferred to a Revaluation Reserve which is non-distributable. The results of the Company are adjusted through the presentation of a non-statutory movement entitled 'Adjustment from Market Value to Contractual Value (as set out in the Prospectus) of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities'.

Commodity Contracts and Securities Awaiting Settlement

The issue or redemption of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, and the creation or cancellation of Commodity Contracts, is accounted for on the transaction date. Where settlement pricing is applied, the transaction will not settle until two days after the transaction date. Where transactions are awaiting settlement at the period end, the monetary value of the Commodity Contracts and Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities due to be settled is separately disclosed within the relevant assets and liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position.

Loans and Receivables

The loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with a fixed payment amount and are not quoted in an active market. After initial measurement the loans and receivables are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method less any allowance for impairment. The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of an instrument and of allocating interest over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash flows (including all fees paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the instrument, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition. Gains and losses on loans and receivables which are impaired are recognised immediately through profit or loss.

2. Accounting Policies (continued)

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received, excluding discounts, rebates, and other sales taxes or duty.

Fees received for the issue and redemption of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are recognised at the date on which the transaction becomes legally binding. All other income and expenses are recognised on an accruals basis.

Foreign Currency Translation

The financial statements of the Company are presented in the currency of the primary economic environment in which it operates (its functional currency). For the purpose of the financial statements, the results and financial position of the Company are expressed in United States Dollars, which is the functional currency of the Company, and the presentational currency of the financial statements.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the period end date are translated at rates ruling at that date. Creation and redemption fees are translated at the average rate for the month in which they are incurred. The resulting differences are accounted for through profit or loss.

Segmental Reporting

IFRS 8 requires operating segments to be identified on the basis of internal reports about components of the Company that are regularly reviewed by the Chief Operating Decision Maker ("CODM") in order to allocate resources to the segments and to assess their performance. The CODM has been determined as the board of directors. A segment is a distinguishable component of the Company that is engaged either in providing products or services (business segment), or in providing products and services within a particular economic environment (geographical segment), which is subject to risks and rewards that are different from those of other segments.

The Company has not provided segmental information as the Company has only one business or product group, classic and longer dated Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, and one geographical segment which is Europe. In addition the Company has no single major customer from which greater than 10% of revenue is generated. All information relevant to the understanding of the Company's activities is included in these financial statements.

7. Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities

Whilst the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are quoted on the open market, the Company's liability relates to its contractual obligations to issue and redeem Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities at set prices on each trading day. These prices are based on an agreed formula, and are equal to the published net asset values ("NAV") of each class of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security. Therefore, the actual contractual issue and redemption of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities occur at a price that corresponds to gains or losses on the Commodity Contracts. As a result the Company has no net exposure to gains or losses on the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and Commodity Contracts.

The Company measures the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities at their market value in accordance with IFRS 13 rather than their Contractual Value (as described in the Prospectus). The market value is deemed to be the prices quoted on stock exchanges or other markets where the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are listed or traded. However Commodity Contracts are valued based on the agreed formula set out in the Prospectus.

The gain or loss on the difference between the Contractual Value of the Commodity Contracts and the market price of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities would be reversed on a subsequent redemption of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and cancellation of the corresponding Commodity Contracts.

11. Financial Risk Management

The Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are subject to normal market fluctuations and other risks inherent in investing in securities and other financial instruments. There can be no assurance that any appreciation in the value of securities will occur, and the capital value of an investor's original investment is not guaranteed. The value of investments may go down as well as up, and an investor may not get back the original amount invested.

The Company is exposed to a number of risks arising from its activities. The information provided below is not intended to be a comprehensive summary of all the risks associated with the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and investors should refer to the most recent Prospectus for a detailed summary of the risks inherent in investing in the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. Any data provided should not be used or interpreted as a basis for future forecast or investment performance.

The risk management policies employed by the Company to manage these are discussed below.

(a) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities as they fall due.

Generally, there is no liquidity risk to the Company because the maturity profile of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and contracts is exactly matched, therefore the Company does not have to wait for a longer-term contract to mature in order to pay its debts to ex-security holders. Furthermore, while the agreements with the Commodity Contract Counterparties include limits (both daily and in the aggregate) on the creation and cancellation of Commodity Contracts, the Company is not obliged to issue and redeem Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities in excess of those limits under the terms of the facility agreement.

(b) Credit Risk

Credit risk primarily refers to the risk that Authorised Participants or the Commodity Contract Counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss.

The value of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and the ability of the Company to repay the redemption price is dependent on the receipt of such amount from the Commodity Contract Counterparties and may be affected by the credit rating attached to each Commodity Contract Counterparty.

To cover the credit risk under the Commodity Contracts, the Commodity Contract Counterparties are obliged to place an equivalent amount of collateral into a pledge account with Bank of New York based on the total outstanding value of the Commodity Contracts at the end of the previous trading day. In the event of default by a Commodity Contract Counterparty, the Company has rights over the amounts placed in this pledge account.

11. Financial Risk Management (continued)

(c) Settlement Risk

Settlement risk primarily refers to the risk that an Authorised Participant or the Commodity Contract Counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss.

The directors believe that settlement risk would only be caused by the risk of the Company's trading counterparty not delivering cash, Commodity Contracts or Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities on the settlement date. The directors feel that this risk is mitigated as a result of the cash or Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities settling through the CREST system. The system ensures that the transaction does not settle until both parties have fulfilled their contractual obligations.

Amounts outstanding in respect of positions yet to settle are disclosed in notes 6 and 7.

(d) Capital Management

The Company's principal activity is the issue and listing of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities. These Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are issued and redeemed as demand requires. The Company holds a corresponding number of Commodity Contracts which matches the total liability of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities issued. ManJer supplies or arranges the supply of all management and administration services to the Company and pays all management and administration costs of the Company. In return for these services the Company pays ManJer a Fee equal to the aggregate of the management fee, licence allowance and creation and redemption fees earned. The Company is not subject to any capital requirements imposed by a regulator and there were no changes in the Company approach to capital management during the year.

As all Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Securities in issue are supported by an equivalent number of Commodity Contracts held with the Commodity Contract Counterparties and the running costs of the Company are paid by ManJer, the directors of the Company consider the capital management and its current capital resources are adequate to maintain the on-going listing and issue of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities.

(e) Sensitivity Analysis

IFRS 7 requires disclosure of a sensitivity analysis for each type of market risk to which the Company is exposed to at the reporting date, showing how comprehensive income and equity would have been affected by a reasonably possible change to the relevant risk variable.

The Company's rights and liabilities in respect of Commodity Contracts and Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, respectively, relates to its contractual obligations to issue and redeem Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities at set prices on each trading day. As a result the Company's contractual and economic liability in connection with the issue and redemption of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities is matched by movements in corresponding Commodity Contracts. Consequently, the Company does not have any net exposure to market price risk. Therefore, in the directors' opinion, no sensitivity analysis is required to be disclosed.

(f) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices (such as foreign exchange rates, interest rates and equity prices) will affect the Company's income or the value of its financial instruments held or issued.

i) Price Risk

The value of the Company's liability in respect of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities fluctuates according to the performance of the underlying commodity indices and the risk of such change in price is managed by the Company by entering into Commodity Contracts with the Commodity Contract Counterparties which match the liability. The Company therefore bears no financial risk from a change in the price of a commodity index or currency by reference to the futures price. Refer to Note 7 for the further details regarding fair values.

However there is an inherent risk from the point of view of investors as the price of commodities, and thus the value of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities, may vary widely due to, amongst other things, changing supply or demand, government and monetary policy or intervention and global or regional political, economic or financial events. The market price of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities is a function of supply and demand amongst investors wishing to buy and sell Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and the bid-offer spread that the market makers are willing to quote. This is highlighted in note 7, and below under the Fair Value Hierarchy.

ii) Interest Rate Risk

The multiplier used in the pricing of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Contracts or the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities takes into account the incremental capital enhancement component of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security, which includes the impact of the interest rates. As a result the Company does not have significant exposure to interest rate risk.

iii) Currency Risk

The Company has exposure to currency risk as the Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are priced in US Dollars and hedged against exchange rate movements between the US Dollar and the Swiss Franc. The directors do not consider the Company to have a significant exposure to risk relating to currency risk arising from the current economic uncertainties facing a number of countries around the world as the gains or losses on the liability represented by the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are matched economically by corresponding losses or gains attributable to the Commodity Contracts.

(g) Fair Value Hierarchy

The levels in the hierarchy are defined as follows:

- Level 1 fair value based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets.
- Level 2 fair values based on valuation techniques using observable inputs other than quoted prices within level 1.
- Level 3 fair values based on valuation techniques using inputs that are not based on observable market data.

Categorisation within the hierarchy is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement of each relevant asset/liability.

The Company is required to utilise the available market price as the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are quoted and actively traded on the open market. Therefore Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities are classified as level 1 financial liabilities.

The Company's rights in respect of Commodity Contracts relate to its contractual obligations to issue and redeem Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities at set prices on each trading day. These prices are based on an agreed formula (set out in the Prospectus), and are equal to the published NAVs of each class of Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Security. Therefore, Commodity Contracts are classified as level 2 financial assets, as the value is calculated using third party pricing sources supported by observable, verifiable inputs.

The Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities and the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Contracts are recognised at fair value through profit or loss upon initial recognition in line with the Company's accounting policy. There are no assets or liabilities classified in level 3. There were no reclassifications during the year.

12. Ultimate Controlling Party

The immediate parent company is HoldCo, a Jersey registered company. Following completion of the acquisition which included HoldCo on 11 April 2018 the ultimate controlling party is WisdomTree Investments, Inc. Prior to 11 April 2018 Graham Tuckwell was the ultimate controlling party of HoldCo through his majority shareholding in ETF Securities Limited.

The value of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Contracts backing the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities is wholly attributable to the holders of the Swiss Franc Currency-Hedged Commodity Securities.

13. Events Occurring After the Reporting Period*Change of Ownership*

On 13 November 2017, the Company announced that WisdomTree Investments, Inc (an exchange-traded product sponsor and asset manager) entered into an agreement to acquire ETF Securities Limited's European exchange-traded product business as a going concern, which includes the Company. The change of ownership occurred on 11 April 2018.
